a wheelchair." - Judy Heumann Judith "Judy" Heumann, widely known as "the mother of the disability rights movement" passed away at the age of 75 on March 4th, 2023 leaving behind a legacy that continues to

advance the inclusion of those with disabilities

both in the U.S. and around the world. After

contracting polio as a child, Judy began using a

wheelchair for mobility. Denied the right to attend school because her wheelchair was considered a "fire hazard" and later in life, denied a teaching license based on a failed medical exam, Judy took a stand and became a lifelong advocate and leader for the rights and independence of those living with disabilities. Judy sued the Board of Education over her denied teaching license and went on to become the first wheelchair user to become a teacher in the state of New York. Judy was instrumental in develop helping to and landmark pass legislation such as Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the Individuals Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). Her arms would sling out, her head would drop, and she would cry. We rushed her to the hospital and she was diagnosed with infantile spasms. It took a few weeks to get them under control with medication. At about 5 months of age, I felt like Lillian wasn't looking at things or people like a baby her age should. We took her to an ophthalmologist

and she was diagnosed with cortical visual impairment which is very

common with babies that have suffered infantile spasms. My husband

and I had never heard of this and were at loss on what to do. We were

We live in the eastern part of Tennessee and couldn't find anyone that could help Lillian because of her age. We were told by our intervention services about the BEST program. I immediately emailed Alison and within 24 hours she replied back. Lillian was 11 months old at the time and wasn't looking at us or playing and reaching for things. After speaking and meeting with the BEST team, I started to realize that there is hope and my baby can improve! We have been doing weekly virtual session with our TVI, LeeAnn, and she has been amazing. She has provided us with so much information, materials, tips, and ideas to help
